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Summary of Results

2002-2003 Student Summary Results: For the ninety-seven students providing suggestions, thirty-four percent of the suggestions dealt with parking, twenty-six percent addressed scheduling of courses or programs, twenty-one percent covered instruction, sixteen percent involved facilities, and three percent were other unrelated suggestions.

2003-2004 Student Summary Results: For the one hundred and forty-two students providing suggestions, thirty-five percent of the suggestions involved facilities, twenty-seven percent addressed scheduling of courses or programs, fifteen percent dealt with parking, twelve percent covered instruction, and eleven percent were other unrelated suggestions.

2004-2005 Student Summary Results: For the one hundred and sixty-four students providing suggestions, twenty-six percent of the suggestions addressed scheduling of courses or programs, twenty-four percent involved facilities, nineteen percent dealt with parking, seventeen percent covered instruction, seven percent involved financial aid, and seven percent were other unrelated suggestions.

2005-2006 Student Summary Results: For the one hundred and sixty-eight students providing suggestions, twenty-seven percent of the suggestions involved facilities, twenty percent dealt with parking, nineteen percent addressed scheduling of courses or programs, seventeen percent covered instruction, seven percent involved financial aid, and nine percent were other unrelated suggestions.

2006-2007 Student Summary Results: For the one hundred students providing suggestions, twenty-six percent of the suggestions dealt with parking, twenty-five percent addressed scheduling of courses or programs, twenty-four percent addressed facilities, eleven percent covered instruction, six percent involved financial aid, and eight percent were other unrelated suggestions.

On October 30, 2006, and October 31, 2006, students in Arts and Sciences, Business and Public Services, Comprehensive Studies, Health Education, and Industrial and Engineering Technology were surveyed during 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. classes. The students were asked to respond to the following question: What suggestions do you have for improving Tri-County Technical College? A total of three hundred and fifty-two students were surveyed. One hundred or 28% provided suggestions. The following lists their responses to the question.

Suggestions from Arts and Sciences Students

- Be more technical, have more class selection.
- More availability of courses for parents with children.
- Better parking.
- More freedom for the video game people in the lobby/cafeteria.
- Advisors and instructors need to be more attentive, most students are here with some type of desire to further their education.
- Better information about transferring courses and majors.
- The financial office is not helpful or competent in assisting students to find financial aid. Their attitudes are inconsiderate and their availability is unreliable.
- Better parking.
- More financial aid for mothers returning to school and more evening classes by internet or in the Seneca community; for that matter, in more of the surrounding communities. Gas is so high now that driving is expensive for a long distance student.
- Assign advisors to students and make them aware of whom their advisor is.
- Better parking and fewer stairs.
- I would suggest improving the website and campus tutorials for new students.
- Making it easier to register from your home computer.
- A cleaner environment, better advisors, athletics for women, more class offering time slots, and educated instructors.
- A bus.
- Better assistance in the financial aid department; no one there seems to understand the concept of student financial privacy. And also, offer language classes (i.e. French) during the summer.

- Keep technology in all classrooms.
- Offer some covering over stairs in parking lot for when it rains.
- Customer service in the business office and financial aid needs much improvement. There should be more survey questions on those areas also.
- Have a list of scholarships and grants in the financial aid office.
- Get rid of the rude librarians.
- Better parking, the hill kills.
- Classrooms are small and tight.
- This is not a jump school to Clemson University. Maybe you should look at doing that; offer classes that are related to Clemson's classes. Suggestions from Business and Public Services Students
