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On October 30, 2006, and October 31, 2006, students in Arts and Sciences, Business and Public Services, Comprehensive Studies, Health Education and Industrial and Engineering Technology were surveyed during 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. classes. The students were asked to respond to the following question: What can Tri-County Technical College do to better assist students in completing their programs of study and graduating from Tri-County Technical College? A total of one thousand four hundred and two students were surveyed. The following lists their responses to the question for 2006-2007.

Suggestions from Arts and Sciences Students

- More available classes to students in that major. Clearer courses on the major.
- Actually help them out by reaching out to them.
- Have better tools to assist in which classes are transferable to which schools. Have better communication with other four-year schools.
- Helping more by deciding what is best for the student.
- Fix the 2nd bridge kitty bus.
- Have childcare for mothers based on income.
- Everyone should know the correct information to tell students. Too many of us are given totally inaccurate information.
- Drop the cost.
- Get them better help.
- I had problems getting a class because they decided not to even have it.
- Better advising.
- Give determined allowances for parents with children to lessen the outside work load.
- Different problems for different students, it would be hard to satisfy everyone.
- Better progress tracking.
- When applying online, tell which classes are full on the front page.
- More online courses.
- Buying books for no reason.
- Need to have more of the basics offered and have college catalogs to analyze what classes university transfer students need to take.

- Advisors do a better job in advising the students and offer more of each class at more times of availability.
- Have more available morning classes.

Suggestions from Business and Public Services Students

- More financial aid.
- Spread the word about grants, scholarships, and loans that are available.
- Offer more online courses.

- Offer more courses and make online less confusing; quit changing passwords, offer more lines for courses.

- Get better advisors who don't make you take unnecessary classes.
- More openings for classes at the same time.
- Child care facility on campus.
