JOB EQUIVALENTS BASED ON INCOME

Job equivalents are a measure of the average-wage jobs that a given amount of income can potentially support. They are calculated by dividing income by the average income per worker in the region. Based on the added income created by TCTC, the job equivalents are as follows:

Effect of college operations = **867** job equivalents

Effect of student spending = **87** job equivalents

Effect of student productivity = **4,346** job equivalents

Overall, the added income created by TCTC and its students supported **5,300** job equivalents.

In FY 2012-13, TCTC's total impact on the TCTC Service Area economy was \$199.3 million in added income, equal to 2.0% of the region's Gross Regional Product.

TCTC PAYROLL & EXPENSES SUPPORT LOCAL BUSINESSES

- In FY 2012-13, TCTC employed 701 full-time equivalent (FTE) faculty and staff, with an annual payroll of \$26.6 MILLION.
 Much of this was spent in TCTC Service Area to purchase groceries, clothing, and other household goods and services.
- The college is itself a buyer of goods and services and spent another **\$27.1 MILLION** to support its operations during the analysis year. Of this, 21% was spent in the region.
- The net impact of college payroll and expenses in the TCTC Service Area was \$32.6 MILLION in added regional income.



TCTC STUDENTS BOOST LOCAL SPENDING

- Approximately 1% of TCTC students relocated to the TCTC Service Area from outside the region to attend the college in FY 2012-13. Their expenditures for room and board, transportation, and other personal goods and services helped support local businesses.
- The expenditures of the college's out-of-region students added approximately \$3.3 MILLION in income to the region during the analysis year.

TCTC TRAINING SUSTAINS A SKILLED WORKFORCE

- Over the years, students have studied at TCTC and entered or re-entered the workforce with newly-acquired skills. Today thousands of former students are employed in the TCTC Service Area.
- As students apply the skills they acquired at the college, they
 are rewarded with higher incomes. They also raise business
 profits through their increased productivity. These higher
 incomes and increased profits create even more income as
 they are spent in the region.
- In FY 2012-13, the effect of former TCTC students on the regional economy amounted to \$163.4 MILLION in added income.
